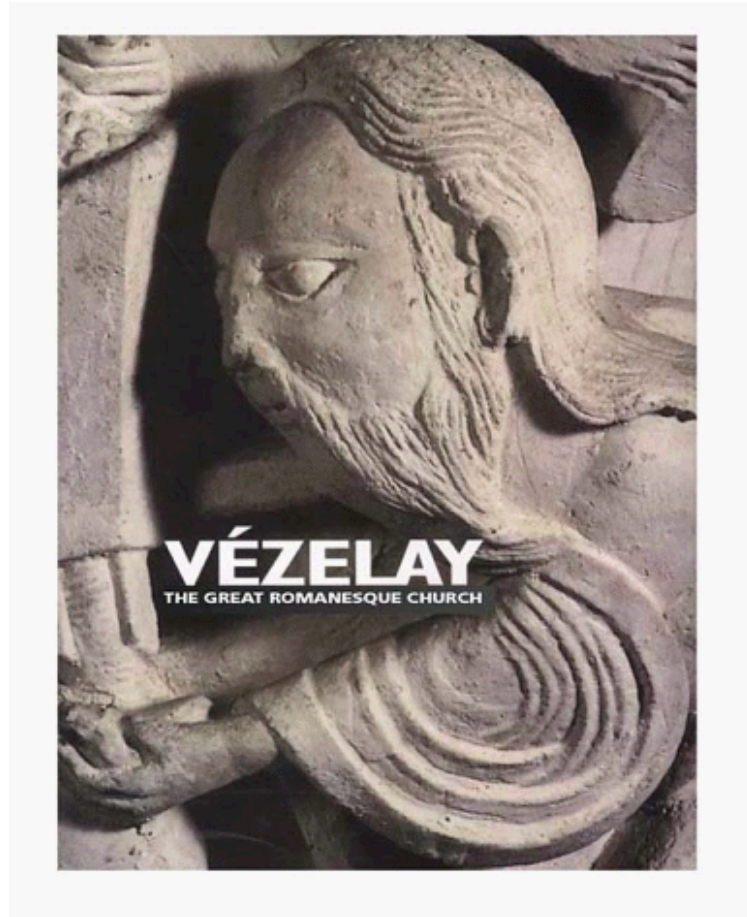

Upon my return I ordered this book because it is difficult to see the detail of the sculpture at the Basilica in Vezelay because most of the sculpture is at the top of columns and the lighting is not good. This book shows all the detail of the art.

The historic abbey church of Sainte-Madeleine, or Mary Magdalene, at Vezelay in Burgundy is one of the wonders of medieval art. Begun in 1120 in the Romanesque style, the church is a jewel of early-twelfth-century architecture. But most remarkable of all is Vezelay's sculpture. The tympana - the massive semicircles of stone that crown the main doors - and the capitals of the columns in the nave, richly carved with figures from the Bible and Christian legend, are among the finest works of sculpture in the world. This superbly illustrated book offers a complete visual record of the architecture and sculpture of Sainte-Madeleine. The photographs are accompanied by an authoritative text that guide the reader through the church, sculpture by sculpture, truly bringing this magnificent place to life.

From Library Journal The abbey church of Saint Mary Magdalene at Vezelay is one of the most perfect examples of the Romanesque style in the world. Owing to the nature of architectural construction, the church serves as a kind of time line. The move from a Romanesque to Gothic "mindset" is evident, and the progression into modern times shows in points as well. It also has historic importance as a pilgrimage church, as the location of St. Bernard's speech to the Second Crusade of 1146, and as the point of departure for the Third and Seventh Crusades. Mouilleron (medieval art history, Sorbonne) is well qualified to address the topic; Faure has produced a beautiful visual sample of what the church at Vezelay offers as a historic and artistic contribution. With little available in English on this particular church, this book does address a gap in the literature; yet somehow it is not quite enough.
